The use of headgears may different from purposes, for instance, headgears can be used for performances such as tribal dance or theatre, in other cases the headgear can be used for specific reasons such as ritual and traditional practices or for some ceremonial offerings. Headgear can be usually in the form of zoomorphic or in figurative and decorated forms.

#### 4 | FACE PAINTING AND BODY ART

The most attractive part of tribal art/tradition is the face painting and body art, face painting becomes the attractive and eye catching, and natural pigments are used in most of the cases, the icons and the symbols on the face may indicate thematic and symbolic representations.
